From the Preacher's Desk

"New Sermon Series"

THROUGH THE WILDERNESS is our theme for July, and while we will spend a little time Sunday going through what that means...I wanted to begin preparing your hearts and minds for our lessons.

One set of scripture that I constantly thought about in preparation for our series was Psalm 95. It does not specifically have an author listed; however, the Hebrew writer attributes it to David, (Hebrews 4:7). Psalm 95 is a general song of praise. The thrust of the psalm indicates that the people were in a state of rebellion, much like the generation that provoked God in the wilderness. As one preacher wrote, "[Psalm 95] has about it a ring like that of the church bells, and like the bells, it sounds both merrily and solemnly, at first ringing out a lively peal, and then dropping into a funeral knell as if tolling at the funeral of the generation which perished in the wilderness" (Charles Spurgeon).

Our story begins long before the Psalm, and even long before the wilderness itself. We begin with Joseph, one of the twelve sons of Israel, who was sold to slave traders by his brothers. With God's help, Joseph rose to power in Egypt, helping not only the Egyptians survive a famine, but his own family who were driven in his direction. As time passed, and forgiveness was given from Joseph to his brothers, the Israelite people settled in the Egyptian territory of Goshen. Due to Joseph's immense power in Egypt, the Israelites prospered in that land under his protection and made it their home. At the beginning of Exodus, (1:7), it says, "But the people of Israel were fruitful and increased greatly; they multiplied and grew exceedingly strong, so that the land was filled with them."

Unfortunately for the Israelite people, whom some estimates were in the millions, Joseph died, and almost immediately the people were made slaves of the Egyptians. Exodus 1:8-9 explains, "Now there arose a new king over Egypt, who did not know Joseph. And he said to his people, 'Behold, the people of Israel are too many and too might for us.'" As the rest of the story goes, the Israelites would remain in Egyptian bondage until God sent Moses, a newborn

baby, into the home of the Egyptian Pharaoh to be raised by his daughter. As the years passed by Moses would learn to long and love his people, whom he hated seeing in this state of enslavement. So, with God, ten plagues, and faith, the vast nation of Israel fled from Egypt, crossed the parted Red Sea, and into the wilderness.

I wish the story ended with, "and they lived faithfully ever after" but that is far from the truth. God promised the Israelites a land "flowing with milk and honey" (Exodus 3:8) and when they approached that land and saw its current inhabitants, their faith failed them. They became convinced they would lose any battle, even though God told them they would win. Their lack of belief in God's word and promises brought forth the wrath of God. He cursed the Israelite people with forty years of wilderness wandering until the unbelieving generation died off, never stepping foot in the Promised Land.

Fast forward to today, and just like the Israelites there are many moments that we experience where our faith is often tested, and we have a similar decision to make. Do we put our trust in God, and His Word, or do we choose the world, knowing that our choice will determine our everlasting life? These "wilderness moments", like depression, can cause someone to lose faith and wander away from God more than they desire. As we will notice, in the weeks coming, God is the answer out of the wilderness, if only we are willing to see and accept.

I am super excited about our series for July, as I hope you are as well. Please consider joining us each Sunday morning, in person, as we help each other *THROUGH THE WILDERNESS*. I leave you with Psalm 95, where our article began, and ask that you consider v. 8-11, "do not harden your hearts, as at Meribah, as on the day of Massah in the wilderness, when your fathers put me to the test and put me to the proof, though they had seen my work. For forty years I loathed that generation, and said, 'They are a people who go astray in their heart, and they have not known my ways.' Therefore I swore in my wrath, they shall not enter my rest." God bless!




